

Training in Music-Based Therapeutic Interventions: from Fundamentals to Multidisciplinary Implementation

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Course Description:

This course is composed of 13 asynchronous self-paced online modules and 10 synchronous live webinars, providing clinicians and musicians with a set of evidence-based resources describing the main techniques used in music-based therapeutic interventions and their clinical applications. This is the first training program that is tailored to the needs of Middle Eastern populations, and which includes a history of music-based interventions in the Middle East, and the use of Middle Eastern music tools and sounds.

Participants will be able to differentiate 'therapeutic music' or 'music medicine' from 'music therapy' and to identify the conditions that would benefit from a music therapy intervention. Participants will learn and explore the latest research studies and clinical trials that use therapeutic music and music therapy for neurological, neuropsychiatric and neurodevelopmental conditions, and will acquire basic skills for a multidisciplinary implementation of music-based interventions. They will be able to describe protocols and applications based on therapeutic objectives, as well as using clinical evaluations to recognize the need and potential benefits of music therapy in a clinical case. This course covers the basics of human neuroanatomy and neurophysiology, the basics of music theory (including specificities of Middle Eastern Music) and details the various techniques used with individuals with special needs in the Middle East, and those with mental health issues and neurological diseases such as Alzheimer's and Parkinson's.

Most importantly, this course will open a debate and invite attendees to discuss how healthcare professionals, musicians and music therapists can work together to implement effective music-based interventions in Qatar, while raising awareness of the benefits and risks of music-based interventions.

Course Objectives:

- 1- Identify and distinguish the difference between music medicine, music therapy and other music-based interventions
- 2- List clinical applications of music-based interventions and devise the appropriate approach for their implementation
- 3- Recognize the potential benefits of introducing a music-based intervention in a clinical case
- 4- Explain the principles behind the techniques used by music therapists to treat speech deficits, motor deficits and cognitive and behavioral disorders.
- 5- Identify the main actors of the multidisciplinary team needed for implementation of musicbased interventions
- 6- Discuss the challenges and solutions for implementing music-based interventions in the Middle East
- 7- Examine cultural specificities to take into consideration when implementing music-based interventions in the Middle East.

Biographies

Ghizlane Bendriss, PhD, DipIBLM

Assistant Professor of Biology, Lifestyle Medicine Professional

Ghizlane Bendriss is neuroscientist who obtained a PhD in neurophysiology and neurobiology and a master's in cognitive neuroscience from the University of Aix-Marseille, France. She has also obtained her diploma in lifestyle medicine from the International Board of Lifestyle Medicine. She is working as an assistant professor in biology at Weill Cornell Medicine-Qatar, where she teaches neurosciences and biology in the premedical division and leads numerous research projects and CPD activities around the gut-brain axis, including the role of the gut microbiome in health and diseases. She is the lead investigator of the first music-based clinical trial registered in Qatar, which explores the EEG and emotional correlates of Middle Eastern Music Modes or 'maqams' on a multiethnic population. She is the founder of the association Mind & Music in France, which aims to promote equity in access to music culture and raise awareness on the power of music to influence health.

Aseel Massoud, MD, MT

Physician, master's degree in music therapy Professional Lyrical Soprano

Aseel Jamal Massoud is a Syrian medical doctor and a registered doctor in Barcelona, Spain. She obtained her master's degree in music therapy (MT) from the University of Barcelona and a bachelor's degree in classical singing from the Conservatorio del Liceu, Barcelona, where she also graduated as professional lyrical soprano. She worked on music therapy research in neurorehabilitation at Hospital del Mar in Barcelona from 2018 to 2020. Her latest investigation focused on in the social and emotional impact of music during confinement due to the COVID-19 pandemic (2020). Dr. Aseel practiced as a music therapist for children with autism at the Catalan Institute of Music Therapy in Barcelona.

She is the Founder of the Sol Azul project for music therapy and art coaching for emotional, social and mental health. She is also the founder of the NEAR YOU online music therapy project and a vocal member in the artistic group Athrodeel.

Rula Barghouthi is a music therapist with extensive experience in teaching music and conducting music therapy sessions with various patients of diverse needs. Rula started learning music at a very young age, having been captivated by the sounds of different instruments and the amazing extent to which music can capture emotions and feelings beyond what can be expressed in words or in any other way.

Having seen how music can help people express their emotions and transcend negative situations, she decided to further pursue a career in music therapy. Acquiring her bachelors and currently her master's degree at the University ArtEz in Netherlands, Rula pursued further training in different countries, including neurologic music therapy from the Academy of Neurologic Music Therapy,

thereby acquiring experience in designing therapies for people suffering from cerebral palsy, autism spectrum disorders, Down syndrome, learning disorders and many other neurological and neurodevelopmental conditions. Waseem Kotoub, MD

Medical Doctor, Concert Pianist, Composer, Health Systems and Hospital Management

Dr. Kotoub was born in the UK and received most of his musical education from Vladimir Zaretisky. He has already gained a solid pianistic experience at the Royal Academy of Music in London with

Diana Ketler and Colin Stone, which he graduated from with merit and got his PGdip in piano performance and the LRAM in music teaching. He has participated in several master classes with eminent musicians such as Imre Rohman, Christopher Elton, Victor Bunin, Paskal Nimorofski and Petras Guiniasis. As a special prize winner of the IBLA piano competition in Italy, and first prize winner of the KRSF competition, he has been playing with several orchestras such as Brandenburg National Orchestra under the baton of many conductors such as Solhi Al-Wadi, Ahmad Al-Saiedi (director of the Egyptian Opera House), and Sebastian Wiegle. He has appeared in various countries such as the UK, Hungary, Italy, Germany, Lebanon, Oman, Japan and Jordan. His first recording, Last of Ommyads, was released in 2008, recording Walid's Hajjar contemporary piano works. His specialties include classical, folk, latin and oriental music. His second CD was launched in 2015 under the name Healing Tunes.

Waseem is a medical doctor who merges medicine and music by using music therapy with autistic children and those with other other conditions as a means of communicating and aiding the development of other skills. In 2007, he established the first music therapy centre in the MENA region, which attracted attention from international media and TV channels. Waseem has given several talks and interviews about music therapy and made television and radio appearances on the DW news channel, the Polska Cultural channel, Aljazeera TV, Al-Arabiya TV, German national radio Channel 3 and American NPR radio channel, amongst others. He has a master's degree in health systems and hospital management from Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine. His strong management background allowed him to act as director of several festivals and head the programs and partnerships department at the British Council.

Zhivka Pesheva

Pianist, Senior Piano Faculty

Zhivka holds a master's in psychology in music education from Sheffield University in the UK and a bachelor's degree in piano performance and pedagogy from Bulgaria. Zhivka is a highly qualified pianist and piano pedagogue; she led successful piano practice and studio in Cambridge, UK and is currently working at Qatar Music Academy. She leads and organizes international piano workshops for young pianists and advanced piano students in Qatar and the UK).
